The Tresillian Story

Tresillian's Centenary in 2018 celebrates one hundred years of history as Australia's leading child and family health service. Formed in 1918, as The Royal Society for the Welfare of Mothers and Babies, Tresillian has supported generations of parents during the early days of their baby's life, providing reassurance and building confidence.

Founded at the Sydney Town Hall, on 4th November, 1918, the Society was a NSW government initiative sparked by soaring infant mortality rates and a desperate shortage of health services for new mothers.

The primary goal of Tresillian today remains unchanged: that of securing the best possible life and future for young Australians. As an organisation, Tresillian continues to grow. Five new Family Care Centres opened in 2018, the Tresillian 2U mobile parenting van launched

on the Mid North Coast and a Development Application was approved by North Sydney Council to build a new purpose-built facility at our Wollstonecraft heritage Centre that will house combined residential and day services. For parents this means greater access to parenting programs, counselling, and one on one advice and support from Tresillian's healthcare professionals.

We now invite you to celebrate the diverse history and heritage of Tresillian through this wonderful journey into the organisation's rich past.

1900's

Our Beginnings

The Royal Society for the Welfare of Mothers and Babies was set up to co-ordinate the efforts of many NSW charitable and Government agencies working in the field of infant welfare during the post war period. At the time, the infant mortality rate was so high, that while during the First World War tragically up to 60,000 men were killed in battle, the country also lost around 58,000 babies to poor nutrition.

What emerged was the Society for the Welfare of Mothers and Babies, a new organisation providing specialist care for babies with feeding and behavioural problems, a training school for nurses and a residential and outpatients clinic for mothers and babies.

The Society was formally established on 4th November, 1918 at the Sydney Town Hall, at a meeting chaired by the Sydney Lord Mayor, Hon J. Joynton Smith M.L.C.

Incorporated by an Act of Parliament

An Act incorporating the Society was passed by the NSW Parliament in 1919 and an office was established in the Chief Secretary's Building, Sydney. In April, 1919, His Majesty King George V assented to the prefix "Royal" and his wife, Queen Mary officially became Patron shortly afterwards, until her death in 1953. On a visit to Australia in 1954, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, granted her patronage to the Society and remains Patron to this day.

Our First President

The Society's founding President was The Hon. Sydney Reginald Innes-Noad M.L.C. who ensured that the aims of the Society were vigorously pursued - its goals were:

- The saving of baby life and the amelioration of the conditions of life of children up to school age
- The ensuring of proper nursing and health conditions to every expectant mother prior to and subsequent to childbirth
- Such further objects and purposes as may be proclaimed by Government

The Hon. Innes-Noad had a vision for the Society – that of securing the best possible life and future for young Australians. In the first Annual Report, he summed up the reason for the Society's existence: 'The war has forcibly brought home to us the fact that our babies are our best asset; for the tiny fingers grasping thin air today, will shape the destinies of tomorrow. No sacrifice can therefore be too great, nor effort too strenuous, to promote the wellbeing and the happiness of mothers and the care of their little ones' (RSWM&B, 1919:4).

Nurse Education – the cornerstone of the Society

Nurse education has been at the cornerstone of the Society's educational activities. The first Medical Director, Dr Margaret Harper was an innovator and pioneer who travelled to New Zealand to

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How did Tresillian get its name?

In 1921, the Society purchased 2 Shaw Street, Petersham, to house Australia's first Infant Mothercraft Training School. 'Tresillian' was the name bestowed on the home which was built by the Cornish born, Mr Langdon whose family were lumber merchants founding the business of 'Langdon & Langdon'.

The palatial Petersham house reflected the Langdon's timbercraft traditions with fine cedar doors, partitions and a magnificent staircase. During his lifetime, Mr Langdon was an Alderman and Mayor of Petersham. It's thought he named his home 'Tresillian', as a tribute to memories of his Cornish childhood. The Society affectionately became known as Tresillian from then on. The property was described as 'a roomy modern house with charming grounds'. Dame Margaret Davidson officially opened the Petersham Centre on 7th September, 1921 asking for 'help and interest' with this very important work.

In its first year of operation, 30 mothers and 30 babies were admitted to Tresillian and it was reported 'all had improved with lactation induced and mothers able to nourish their children'. 46 outpatients were also treated successfully.

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study the methods being used under the Plunkett system, led by Health Reformer and Director, Dr Truby King. On Dr Harper's return in 1921, her report to the government recommended the opening of an Infant Training School to service the increasing demand for trained staff in the Baby Clinics. Post graduate certificate courses were offered to those holding either obstetric or general certificate qualifications.

The important components of the Plunkett system were "Standardisation of methods". These were initially implemented by Dr Harper, but by 1923, Dr Truby King was critical of the methods employed at the Society's Training School, claiming they were not following his principles. Dr Margaret Harper responded by saying that the environment in Sydney required adaptation to the Plunkett system. Acrimonious debates and correspondence in the newspapers ensued!

Initially, the courses offered at Tresillian were for general trained nurses only. Later, in 1924 a course for untrained girls as 'Mothers' help' was introduced. The course for general trained nurses was of three months duration and the trainees were paid a fee of £15. From 1924-1932 the Society trained Froebal nurses. These were students who studied for 6 months at the Kindergarten Union and 6 months at a mothercraft hospital with the course combining mothercraft nursing and child care.

Community education

Community education was vigorously pursued by the Society. The first Annual Report in 1919 lists thirteen members on the "Propaganda Committee". headed by Judge Backhouse.

Subsequently, the Society actively promoted publicity campaigns in the city and country, conducted Baby Weeks, produced pamphlets, established a Mothers' Rest Bungalow with displays at the Royal Agricultural Society's Annual Show in Sydney, published regular baby management advisory columns in women's journals and arranged lecture tours in country areas on infant and maternal welfare. One of its most influential publications was Dr Margaret Harper's "Parent's Book".

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Wicker bassinettes

A hallmark of Tresillian has been the handmade wicker bassinettes for baby that are still used to this day. The bassinettes were crafted for Tresillian in the early 1920's by the Royal Blind Society of NSW and have become synonymous with our service to parents. These bassinettes were scrubbed clean by the nurses as each baby was discharged. A truly sustainable cot.

A task for the student nurses was to make chaff mattresses - baking the chaff, filling mattress covers and then sewing them up. A further skill the nurses learnt was making the bassinettes up with an enveloping sheet. There was a real art to folding the large sheet to suit the weather (more layers in winter, less in summer). The babies would be swaddled using these sheets and settle very quickly on the chaff mattress.

Tresillian heads north!

In January, 1927, the Society purchased a property for £4,200 at 2 Second Avenue, Willoughby to service the population of northern Sydney. A Committee of Management for Tresillian North was established and officers elected, and on the 23rd March, 1927 Tresillian North was officially opened by the NSW Minister for Public Health, Mr Cann.

The Sydney Morning Herald (Thursday, 24th March, 1927) reported that Dr. Margaret Harper, Tresillian's Hon. Medical Director, presided at the opening ceremony giving an outline of the work at Tresillian. She said

'One thousand mothers and their babies had been admitted to Tresillian Petersham since 1921, and 12,000 mothers and babies had attended the out-patients' department.' Mr Cann expressed his approval adding, 'Mothercraft was most important in the scheme of things'.

The opening ceremony was attended by a large number of people, among them being several members of the Tresillian Council, including Mrs R. T. (Annie) Forsyth (President of Tresillian's Auxiliary.) Mrs Forsyth worked tirelessly as a volunteer to stage many fundraisers for Tresillian.

Council appointed Matron Norman in charge at Tresillian North.

Tresillian North hosted many events.
The front verandah of the home formed an appropriate stage for the opening by Sir Charles Clubbe, President of the Royal Society for the Welfare of Mothers and Babies, who was accompanied by Lady Clubbe.
Sir Charles emphasised the value of such homes as 'Tresillian North' for the teaching of mothercraft, saying it deserved 'wholehearted support'.

Tresillian Vaucluse opens

During this period the Society opened another training hospital in Greycliffe House, Vaucluse.

In 1934, a proposal was submitted to the Director-General of Public Health for the Society to take over the administration of the Lady Edeline Hospital for Babies in Vaucluse (known as Greycliffe House) overlooking Neilsen Park. On November 26, 1934 the hospital officially became a Tresillian Mothercraft Home.

According to *The Sydney Morning Herald*, the opening by Lady Street, President of the Tresillian Council, attracted quite a crowd with hundreds attending to celebrate what was also the 16th Annual General Meeting of the Society. Guest Speaker was the Town Clerk of Sydney, Mr W.G Layton.



Mothers could stay up to

Mothers could stay up to two weeks

At this time Tresillian existed to serve the baby in all matters relating to nutrition and normal care. For example, a mother with a newborn baby would be admitted to a Tresillian Home straight from hospital for help with the establishment of breastfeeding and general care of the baby such as bathing, settling and feeding.

Mothers had time to recuperate at Tresillian and could stay for up to two weeks. Instruction for the mother was seen as critical to achieving better outcomes for their children.





Carpenter House opens

At a special meeting of the Tresillian Council held on 30th July 1940, the Hospitals Commission approved the Society to take over the administration of what was known for many years as 'Carpenter House' in Wollstonecraft.

The Federal Government had appealed for donations towards the King George V and Queen Mary Jubilee Fund, and Sir Walter and Lady Carpenter donated their beautiful house and grounds in Shirley Road, Wollstonecraft, together with a substantial sum for any necessary alterations. From the hands of the Federal Government, the gift passed to the State Government, which asked the Royal Society for the Welfare of Mothers and Babies to undertake the task of running it.

The Sydney Morning Herald reported on 3rd December, 1940 that 'there was a need for rest homes to which mothers can take their newborn babies before returning home. It went on to outline what was happening behind the scenes in preparation for the opening. 'The Matron, Miss Sheila Carmichael, along

with Sister Tolcher have been hard at work making towels and linen. Matron was able to choose the furnishings for the patients and nurses' quarters, and is proud of the result'!

'Babies are to have their own food room which has been designed with an eye to showing mothers how food can be prepared and kept under much the same conditions as in their own homes. It's no use telling them to use refrigerators if they don't own refrigerators!' Matron pointed out. The food room has a miniature gas stove, ample cupboard space, and a gauze-sided safe through which air can flow out of doors'.

'The parquetry-floored ballroom has been turned into a mothers' dining-room, with three round tables and cream and brown curtains, and provision has been made for winter warmth'.

'Matron has her own sitting-room upstairs, with a glassed-in balcony-bedroom attached, and the rest of the nursing staff will also be accommodated upstairs. Their chief pride is what they call "the Woolcott-Forbes bathroom" which has a green bath set in green tiles, a green wash-basin, and cream tiled walls with a green dado'. The original bathroom can still be found at the Wollstonecraft Centre today.

On 14th December, 1940 Mrs H. P. FitzSimons, wife of the State Minister for Health, officially opened Carpenter House.

Premature babies

Before the setting up of Neonatal Intensive Care Units (NICU) Tresillian cared for many premature infants at all Centres. They were dressed in a nightie structured out of a roll of cotton wool and placed in a bassinette lined with brown paper and woollen blankets, to keep them warm. Hot water bottles were used to maintain baby's temperature.





1950's & 1960's

Around this time, Tresillian began admitting toddlers aged between 12 months and two years, usually presenting with behavioural issues. Matron Clifton, in charge of Petersham explained the Tresillian treatment at that time; 'The treatment is carried out by trained staff who realise the importance of self-control. Much patience is required over a long period but eventually most children are discharged with the defect rectified'!

Tresillian continued to admit premature babies at each of its Centres. Amongst the admissions were many sets of twins and triplets. Babies would be admitted within 24 hours of birth and discharged weeks later when

breastfeeding had been established.

Meanwhile at Tresillian Vaucluse, after more than three successful decades, its isolated location and decreased demand for accommodation, obliged the Society to close the mothercraft home in 1969. In 1970, the house was acquired by the Government under the care of the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service.

Tresillian has always attracted staff who are genuinely passionate about providing guidance and support to families with a baby or toddler. One staff member who served in a management capacity was Miss Sheila Robb who was appointed Matron in charge of Tresillian Vaucluse in 1953 and later Matron in charge of Tresillian Willoughby in 1963. Miss Robb had a wealth of practical mothercraft experience and was well respected as both a manager and clinician.





Dr Margaret Harper

The death of the Society's first Medical Director, Dr Margaret Harper in 1964, was deeply felt by all those who had worked with her. Despite retiring in 1948 she had retained a personal interest in the Society as an Honorary Consultant. A tribute Fund was established for the purpose of establishing a memorial to this outstanding clinician. In 1982, 'The Margaret Harper Clinic' was officially unveiled at Tresillian Wollstonecraft.





A Baroness visits Tresillian!

Perhaps the most significant event of the 1970's was the visit to Tresillian by The Right Honourable Baroness Seear of Paddington, London in July 1975, to open a new wing in the Petersham Centre.

Baroness Seear was a Liberal Life Peer in the UK House of Lords and a strong advocate for the role of working mothers. The Baroness had written numerous books and articles on women's rights. Commonwealth Parliamentary meetings were set up and a press conference followed, resulting in widespread media coverage for Tresillian.

Completed in 1975, the new wing at Tresillian Petersham featured modern fully self-contained rooms for parents and new nurseries. It was officially opened on 31st July, 1975 by the Baroness and named the Kathleen Winning Wing.

Dr Kathleen Winning was recognised in this way because of the dedicated service she had given in the post of Medical Director from 1951 to 1970. She was a formidable force within Tresillian promoting breastfeeding as the ideal way to develop a close relationship with baby and encourage 'understanding and love in a home where child-rearing is a happy, welcome function and not a nuisance', as quoted in the 1970 Tresillian Annual Report.







The Margaret Harper Clinic opens

In 1980, the residential unit at Carpenter House, Wollstonecraft was converted to a Day Stay Clinic to enable more families to access help. Named 'The Margaret Harper Clinic' after Tresillian's first Medical Director, it was officially opened on 30th June, 1982 by His Excellency Air Marshal Sir James Rowland, Governor of New South Wales and Lady Rowland.

The clinic was in high demand with a "Family Stress Centre" set up to address a pressing community need. Social workers and a family psychiatrist were introduced to assist families with more complex care.

Miss Brightfield was the Matron in Charge at Carpenter House at that time and was renowned for her dynamic leadership. A guiding light, she had worked at Tresillian Vaucluse for many years and was a passionate advocate of maternal and child health.

Becoming Family Friendly

It wasn't until the 1980's that Tresillian became truly 'family friendly' encouraging fathers to participate in their baby's care. Pam Davidson (Charge Nurse), together with Matron Muriel Newman changed the beds at Willoughby from singles to doubles and fathers were encouraged to stay. It wasn't long before this was standardised across all Tresillian residential units.

Learning Mothercraft

Becoming a mothercraft nurse required participating in an apprentice style program. Expert, very experienced senior nurses would oversee the more junior nurses. One former student, Cathrine Fowler, elaborates; 'The more senior sisters would arrive and rescue us and more importantly the baby, assisting the mother attach the baby to their breast and bringing a sense of calm to the situation'.

Nurse education remained a priority of the Society. There were two courses – the Mothercraft nurses program for general trained nurses studying for a 'third certificate' in a 6-month period; and a long-course (15 months) for students seeking a career in Mothercraft nursing. The Education Unit, based at Petersham was popular with students despite a very rigorous practical program requiring them to be part of the workforce either at Tresillian or in a paediatric ward.



Tribute to Miss Carr

Miss Evangelyn Carr was a Matron and Director of Education at Tresillian Petersham from 1964 to 1992. For many students she became a key person in their learning to become a Mothercraft nurse. Her quiet efficiency and her wealth of experience in caring for infants and young children was a gift she willingly shared with the students. Miss Carr remains actively involved in Tresillian. A yearly event is setting up the Christmas tree at Tresillian Canterbury which is much appreciated by the staff and families. Over the years she has assisted at many Conferences with stage decoration and organisation. Evangelyn recalls that in the early years she was also responsible for sewing the curtains and baby clothes at Petersham (in her own time!).





Head Office Move

Changes were afoot for head office staff at Tresillian with the city offices occupied by the organisation in Naval House Grosvenor Street, Sydney, closing for redevelopment on December 31, 1981. Council made the decision to move head office temporarily to Wollstonecraft based on the high cost of rentals in the city. Head office was eventually based at Petersham and nowadays at Tresillian Canterbury.

Tresillian Parent's Help Line

In 1988, Tresillian launched the Parent's Help Line service, a dedicated telephone service for parents and carers needing on the spot' advice on a parenting issue. In the first year the service recorded over 14,000 calls with the number of calls steadily increasing each year. An 1800 freecall number was also introduced to enable those living in rural areas to contact Tresillian without paying STD charges. Corporate sponsorship was sought in 1993 to offset the cost of administering the Parent's Help Line and Tresillian is grateful to Johnson & Johnson for the financial support they have provided over the last 25 years. Despite the introduction of new technology, today the Parent's Help Line continues to be a relevant and popular service for parents seeking advice from a Tresillian Nurse. It remains a free service.

Mrs Alison Cox OAM

On Council, Mr Frank Guthrie MBE was succeeded by Mrs Alison Cox OAM as President, with Mr Bob Elmslie OAM, as Vice President. Mrs Cox remained as President until 1990 and presided over a period of major development activity in that period.

Like all members of Council, Mrs Cox gave her time and expertise on a probono basis. She was passionate about wanting to make a difference for families with young children. There's no doubt that she achieved this through her work with Tresillian and her legacy will live on.


Tresillian's first National Conference

In September 1988, Tresillian held its first national Conference for child and family health professionals titled 'Babies, Toddlers & Tears', initiated by Medical Director and paediatrician, Dr John McDonald (pictured) and his team of medical staff. Dr McDonald was a notable figure at Tresillian giving over 50 years service as a Visiting Medical Officer, Medical Director, and later on the Tresillian Council. The other Medical Directors who played a major role in Tresillian were Dr John Quoyle who preceded Dr McDonald, and Dr Neville Don, who followed in 1991. This heralded a new era for Tresillian in providing quality professional development and from that period Conferences were held either annually or bi-annually.

Guthrie Child Care Centre opens

Around this time, President of the Tresillian Council, Mr Frank J Guthrie MBE, saw the need for a long day care facility to give parents a short break or respite from their child. The Council lobbied the Department of Youth and Community Services and the Department of Social Security, to fund the venture. They agreed, and Guthrie Child Care Centre was established on the grounds of Tresillian Wollstonecraft in 1982 for 26 children aged up to 5 years, Monday to Friday. The Centre was named after Mr Guthrie and the first Director was Jane Marshall.

Mr Frank J Guthrie MBE retired in 1985 as President (but remained on Council).

New Strategic Plan

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In the early 1990's, the organisational structure was reviewed and a new Strategic Plan implemented. The outcome was that all Centres were united under one Director of Nursing, Pam Fikar. Pam brought with her a wealth of experience to Tresillian as an educator and Charge Nurse at Willoughby. This created an Organisational Structure that was consistent with NSW Health organisations and enabled Tresillian to present a united front enhancing its status as a leader in child and family health.

1990's

In 1991, a new Tresillian Parenting Guide was launched written by Nurse Educators, Cathrine Fowler and Patricia Gornall (pictured bottom right).

Titled, 'How to Stay Sane in Your Baby's
First Year', the foreword was written by media
personality, Geraldine Doogue, who aptly wrote
'one never quite 'arrives' as a parent, it is one
of life's great explorations with pots of gold
dotted along a path which is sometimes rather
problematic'. The book covered topics such as
preparing for baby, coping with crying and lack
of sleep, feeding, and dealing with postnatal
depression.

'How to Stay Sane in Your Baby's First Year' went on to become a best seller and was republished several times.

Tresillian Wentworth

During that time Sydney's western suburbs and the Lower Blue Mountains district were undergoing a population explosion with thousands of families making it their home. The Tresillian Council saw the need for early parenting services to support families struggling to cope with their new baby, so they vigorously lobbied the NSW Government to consider funding a new Tresillian Centre. Led by President,

Anne Partridge, former Director of Nursing entertaining some toddlers.

Mrs Alison Cox OAM, discussions commenced with the Wentworth Area Board and the state government, to establish a new purpose-built Family Care Centre in the grounds adjacent to Nepean Hospital. The former NSW Minister for Health The Hon. Peter Collins MP had experienced the Tresillian service first hand, and recognised the need for this initiative and on 22nd October, 1990, announced that the Government would provide \$4.6 million towards the cost of the new Centre.

The opening at 11am on 22nd August, 1992 by The Hon. Ron Phillips MP, NSW Minister for Health, was a huge community event with local Clubs all supporting the day.

Sadly, one of the key architects, David Lindner, who designed the Tresillian Wentworth facility, went missing on a holiday to Europe during the project. A remembrance plaque in

remembrance plaque in his name still remains at Tresillian.

Gail Boyle RN, was appointed the first Centre Manager at Tresillian Wentworth.


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Clem Potter, CEO

On 23rd September, 1991, Tresillian's staff were rocked by the sudden death of their much loved General Manager, Mr Clem Potter who had served the organisation as CEO for 20 years. Mr David Hannaford was appointed General Manager in 1992. On Council, Mr Bob Elmslie OAM replaced Mrs Alison Cox OAM, as President.

75 years

In 1992, Tresillian celebrated 75 years with a 75th Birthday Conference for health





professionals at Sydney's newly built ANA Hotel. Special guest speaker at the Conference dinner was Social Researcher, Hugh Mackay, also a 'Tresillian Baby'.

Tresillian Petersham closes

Both the Residential and Day Stay units at Tresillian Petersham continued to be in great demand but it was becoming clear that the ageing building at Petersham needed significant renovation. Funding was tight, so in consultation with the NSW Health, the decision was made to sell the Petersham facility and put the funds into a new purpose-built Centre located behind Canterbury Hospital at Belmore. In March, 1998, 2 Shaw Street, Petersham was sold at auction for \$1.325M.

It was sad to farewell Tresillian's flagship centre after 78 years. To commemorate the occasion, a gala dinner was held at Trethaway Gardens Function Centre, also in Shaw Street,

attended by some 200 staff and friends including one of the first babies to use the Tresillian service, Joy Chardon of Marrickville (Born 1921). Another special quest was Ms Kathleen Clifton, former Director of Nursing from 1936 to 1969, who gave a moving and candid

Tresillian Canterbury opens

Services transferred to Belmore in May and on 11th December 1998, Tresillian Canterbury was officially opened by the NSW Minister for Health, The Hon. Dr Andrew Refshauge MP, at a morning tea at the new facility attended by around 30 guests. Radio personality, Kaylee Harris, the breakfast announcer on 2WS and her baby attended the event with Kaylee speaking candidly about the support she received from Tresillian. The new facility increased services to a 7-day, 22-bed Residential Unit, a 6-place Day Stay Unit and an Outreach service.

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2000-2010

Tresillian continued to respond to the times and in 2000 entered the digital era, launching a new website featuring tips for parents and information on Tresillian services. Help with how to settle a baby continues to be the most popular reason parents visit tresillian.org.au

In 2001, after 25 years of service to Tresillian, Medical Director, Dr Neville Don passed away. Dr Don was a highly valued member of staff who made a significant contribution at a management level, not to mention the care he gave to many families during this time. The Education Room at Canterbury was named the Dr Neville Don room in his honour. Dr Penny Field took on the role of Medical Director.

Research & Education

The Education Unit continued to expand and thrive under the leadership of Dr Cathrine Fowler who ensured Tresillian's long-standing commitment to research continued.

In April 2001, Tresillian introduced the Family and Parentcraft Nursing Certificate for Enrolled Nurses.

This program continued to be offered along with the Graduate Certificate in Child and Family Health Nursing for Registered Nurses. By 2005

this Course was delivered in partnership with the University of Technology (UTS) Sydney, an exciting development for Tresillian.

In 2005 in partnership with the Department of Corrective Services, Dr Fowler also led the initiative to offer a parenting course, 'Mothering at a Distance' for incarcerated mothers, with the aim of improving knowledge for mothers while in prison and when released.

Allied Health

From early on it was acknowledged that many parents experience severe stress and anxiety in the first two years after birth. In 1987, Tresillian held its first pilot postnatal depression program which proved so successful, the program was extended. It demonstrated the effectiveness of psychology services working in collaboration with other health professionals to treat parents experiencing complex mental health issues. Today, under the leadership of Lisiane La Touche, Tresillian's Director of Social Work for more than 25 years, we continue to support the emotional wellbeing of parents who all have the opportunity to see a psychologist or attend a parenting program.

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Mr Bob Elmslie OAM

In 2005, President, Mr Bob Elmslie OAM retired after devoting 15 years to Tresillian as President and 33 years on Council. In 1977, he was awarded the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal and in 1996, an OAM, for his contribution to Tresillian. He is also remembered at Tresillian on a commemorative plaque at Tresillian Canterbury. Mr Elmslie was a businessman starting the stockbroking firm, Valder, Elmslie & Co. Amongst his greatest achievements were driving the opening of Tresillian Centres at Canterbury and Penrith. Mr Elmslie's legacy lives on in 'The Elmslie Foundation', set up to fund annual 'Years of Service' awards for Tresillian Staff members. Solicitor, Ms Sandra Littlewood was then elected President of Council.

Guthrie Expands

The decision was made to extend Guthrie Child Care Centre from 26 to 40 places due to increasing demand for childcare. Both North Sydney Council and the Commonwealth Department of Planning and Community Services provided financial contributions and the impressive new \$1 million addition was officially opened by the Mayor of North Sydney Council, Ms Genia McCaffery, in 2002.

Changes to Service Delivery

In February 2006, Tresillian in partnership with internet service provider, Ninemsn, introduced a pilot program enabling parents to live chat online with a Tresillian Nurse. Initially funded by Ninemsn, and known as 'Messenger Mums', the service was a world first. Now sponsored by Johnson & Johnson and known as Tresillian Live Advice it remains very popular with new parents.

Gidget Scholarship

In 2006, the Gidget Foundation, an organisation dedicated to raising awareness of perinatal anxiety and depression, donated \$100,000 to Tresillian to set up an annual 'Gidget Scholarship Fund'. Each year one or two nurses are funded to study a Course in the area of mental health.



Tresillian Chair

A highlight of this period was the funding by Tresillian of a Chair in Child and Family Health in partnership with the Faculty of Nursing, Midwifery and Family Health, University of Technology UTS (Sydney). In 2006, Dr Cathrine Fowler, Tresillian's Education and Research Manager was appointed Professor for the Chair. Dr Fowler's contribution in terms of research has been a valuable resource for child and family health professionals.

Tresillian Today!

After consultation with the many health professionals referring families to Tresillian, a centralised intake system, to streamline referrals was introduced. Director of Nursing & Clinical Services, Anne Partridge led the implementation that meant referrals were processed more efficiently. While this helped curb waiting lists, the length of residential stays was also reviewed and standardised to 4 nights, 5 days at all Centres to enable more admissions.

In 2013, after 17 years in the role, and 25 years with Tresillian, Anne Partridge stepped down as Director of Nursing. Also at that time, David Hannaford, General Manager, retired after 21 years in the role. Following his retirement, Robert Mills was appointed Chief Executive Officer (CEO) in 2013. Robert came to Tresillian with extensive knowledge and background in the child and family health area. Jenny Smit was appointed Director of Clinical Services and Troy Trgetaric, Director of Corporate Services.

In other changes, the Occasional Care

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service at Wollstonecraft for parents needing short term care for their child was closed, with many parents favouring long day care. The service had been in operation for over 30 years.

In September 2013, the first of many Tea Parties was held in the gardens of Tresillian Wollstonecraft to raise funds for Tresillian. This annual event continues to attract hundreds of mothers of all ages. Volunteer Sue Robson, generously assisted with these events over the years.

Tresillian has continued to change with the times and in October 2015, published its first dedicated Social Media pages featuring tips on parenting - these continue to be a valuable resource for families. Furthermore, a YouTube Channel was launched on 3rd April, 2017 and includes a series of thirteen new Parent Education videos.

The Tresillian website, tresillian.org.au continues to be reviewed to meet the needs of parents looking for tips and advice on caring for their baby.

Clinical Practice

Tresillian remains committed to an evidence based clinical practice model across all services. Over the past two decades the amount of research both internally and externally has been significantly expanded. Evaluating clinical practice and supporting staff research competence remains a priority. Tresillian was one of the first early parenting organisations to gain the Australian Council on Healthcare Services (ACHS) Accreditation.

Child & Family Health Education

Tresillian staff continue to assist NSW Health to develop and implement education programs for health professionals. In the 1990's and 2000's, postnatal depression programs were developed in collaboration with the NSW Institute of Psychiatry. Currently, Tresillian's Professional Practice and Innovation Centre is responsible for developing and implementing the 'Advanced Nurse Practice Course' for the Sustaining NSW Families Home Visiting Program.

Tresillian's involvement in child and family health education provision now goes beyond Australia. Educators have been invited to provide Child and Family Health Courses in South Korea, China, Hong Kong and Indonesia.



Opening of AWH Tresillian Parents & Babies Service, Albury Wodonga

Expansion into regional Australia

Regional expansion has been a focus of the last decade to enable more families to access Tresillian's specialist services without having to drive to Sydney.

Initially three Tresillian Day services opened. The first in partnership with Albury Wodonga Health (AWH) known as the Albury Wodonga Health and Tresillian Parents and Babies Service opened in October, 2015.

Adjunct Professor Susan O'Neil, CEO Albury Wodonga Health joined Tresillian's CEO, Robert Mills, to celebrate the opening with local dignitaries and members of the community. The was the first Tresillian facility to be located outside New South Wales.

In Lismore on the NSW North Coast, another partnership was set up with the North Coast Primary Health Network and Northern NSW Local Health District. The Centre was officially opened in November, 2015 by Mrs Karen Hogan, wife of Kevin Hogan MP, Federal Member for Page, and Lismore's Mayor, Jenny Dowell.

Then in May, 2016 the Tresillian in Murrumbidgee Day Service, at Wagga Wagga was launched in partnership with Murrumbidgee Local Health District. Special guests included the Hon. Bronnie Taylor, MLC, Member of the Legislative Council and Parliamentary Secretary for the Deputy Premier and Southern NSW.

During this period, Deborah Stockton was appointed to the position of Operational Nurse Manager - Regional Services at Tresillian to manage the establishment of these services.

Tresillian launches in China

In December, 2017, Tresillian was invited to join a delegation led by the Premier of NSW to the 26th NSW-Guangdong Joint Economic Meeting (JEM) in Guangdong Province.

It was announced that Tresillian would be providing child and family health services in China with the first Tresillian Centre to open in Chengdu, in partnership with CHS Healthcare, in early March, 2019.

Tresillian's Professor Cathrine Fowler, and specialist staff will also be delivering education and training programs in child and family health to Chinese nursing students.

Five more Regional Centres + Tresillian 2U Mobile Early Parenting Van

An action arising from Tresillian's Strategic Plan (2017-2020) was to improve access to early parenting services to families in regional communities and beyond. So, we were very excited to learn that as part of the NSW Government's \$157 million funding commitment to support new families announced in June, 2018, Tresillian received \$2.2 million per year for four years, to open five new Family Care Centres in Queanbeyan, Coffs Harbour, Dubbo, Taree and Broken Hill for vulnerable families living in regional NSW. The Centres were opened throughout October and November, 2018. Tresillian's Operational nurse Manager, Regional Services, Debbie Stockton played a major role in the commissing of these services.










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A Note from the Editor

Tresillian in 2019



In 2019 Tresillian's specialist early parenting services aim at improving the health and psycho-social outcomes for infants, children aged 0-5 years and their families. The Tresillian service offers education and support to families from child and family health nurses and allied health professionals. Parents require a Referral from a health professional to access Tresillian's Day Services and Residential Units. Services include:



Residential Inpatient Units

These are located at Canterbury, Willoughby and Nepean with a total of 86 beds (for both parents and their babies). Residential stays are 4 nights/5 days. Both parents are welcome to stay with their infant.

On 1st July 2019 Tresillian was appointed Service Provider of the Tresillian QEII Family Centre, in Curtin, ACT in partnership with ACT Health. The QEII has a 13-bed Residential Unit servicing the ACT community and surrounding areas.

Day Services

These provide a range of services for families experiencing early parenting challenges, including infant sleep and settling difficulties, and operate from 8am-4.30pm, Monday to Friday at Tresillian Centres in Sydney at Belmore, Nepean, Wollstonecraft and Willoughby, and in regional NSW, at Lismore, Wagga Wagga, Queanbeyan, Dubbo, Coffs Harbour, Broken Hill, Taree and in Albury Wodonga, Victoria.

Tresillian 2U Mobile Early Parenting Van

The Tresillian 2U Mobile Early Parenting Van is based on the Mid North Coast of NSW, where qualified Tresillian Nurses visit local communities. These services are all free of charge to families with a Medicare card.

Specialist Parenting Programs

Tresillian provides specialist programs to support the development of a positive relationship between children and parents who at times experience more complex challenges.

Tresillian Parent's Help Line

The Tresillian Parent's Help Line opens from 7am to 11pm Monday to Sunday, 1300 272 736. This free service offers parenting advice and support from a Tresillian Nurse for those with young children.

Tresillian Live Advice

Tresillian Live Advice is a web based free chat service available via the Tresillian website, offering parenting advice and support from a Tresillian Nurse.

Tresillian Website

tresillian.org.au offers a range of information and resources for parents including links to educational YouTube videos and Tresillian's Social Media pages. A referral pathway for health professionals is also located on the Tresillian website.

Parenting Programs

Parenting programs are regularly facilitated by nurses, social workers and psychologists at all Tresillian Family Care Centres.

Counselling services

Counselling services for families are available at all Tresillian Centres.

Tresillian's Professional Practice and Innovation Centre

- supports Tresillian staff and external health professionals develop their clinical skills using practice development approaches.
- works in partnership with the University of Technology, Sydney (UTS) to deliver the Graduate Certificate program in Child and Family Health Nursing.
- develops parenting education and child and family health professional resources, and undertakes regular research projects.
